Meeting Minutes – Tuesday, March 12, 2024, 4 pm via teleconference

The meeting was called to order at 4:01 pm (EST) by the Chair.

- **1. Previous Meeting Minutes**. There were no changes or corrections to the minutes of the February 14, 2024 LSAT meeting. Accordingly, they were approved and adopted.
- **2. Community Comments.** There were no community comments.

3. LSAT Focus Topics

• Comprehensive School Plan (CSP). Principal Hassler shared a power point presentation providing an comparative overview of beginning of the year ("BOY") and middle of year ("MOY") data.

OVERVIEW

Academics:

ELA: 77% of students scoring on/mid/above grade level – CSP goal met 39% of African American students scoring on/mid/above 1% away from CSP goal

40% of special education students scoring on/mid/above 10% away from CSP goal

84% of students in K/1 scoring at or above – 1% away from goal 57% of African American (K-1 only) students scoring at or above – 13% away from CSP goal

Math: 68% of students scoring on/mid/above grade – 2% away from goal 26% of African American students scoring on/mid/above 24% away from CSP goal

38% of special education students scoring on/mid/above 12% away from CSP goal

83% of students in K scoring at or above – 2% away from goal 80% of pre-K teachers regularly implementing Building Blocks currently – goal met

- Q: With respect to those areas in which the CSP EOY goal is very close to being met or has been met MOY, would it be possible to adjust those goals and consider stretch goals?
- A: Principal Hassler responded that is a good suggestion and something to consider with respect to developing informal stretch goals for EOY for those areas

• Budget – SY2024-25.

Principal Hassler shared that the Maury's submitted SY2024-25 budget provides for two additional general education teachers - one for 4th Grade and one for 5th Grades in addition to the Initial Budget Allocation's provision for an additional Special Education teacher. She is waiting on final approval from DCPS, but does not anticipate any changes to the submitted budget. There were trade-offs in order to provide for the two new general education positions and she will be share those publicly once the budget is approved.

4. General Issues/Advocacy / Community Engagement

Classrooms and Building e.g., HVAC; Playground equipment
Patrick Koontz shared that the HVAC team has been in the building
almost daily for the past couple of weeks identifying issues and
trouble shooting problems, and work orders are being escalated.
He reported that new latches had been placed on the playground
gates and is aware of general wear and tear issues impacting the
playground. With respect to the basketball court, he noted that the
hoops are deliberately set at a height suitable for the students and the
posts were made so that the height cannot be adjusted. He stated
that bumper guards could be placed on the corners of the backboards
for safety – and will look into making that happen.
In addition, he shared that the school is working on having new paper
towel dispensers placed into the student bathrooms.

• Technology, e.g., student tablet access and capability

The LSAT Chair shared concerns that it appears that there are several grades that do not have a sufficient number of functioning laptops on a regular basis to support student needs, particularly in the upper grades in light of testing requirements. He asked if this is an accurate assessment, and, if so, what parents might do, including advocacy, to help.

Principal Hassler noted that student laptops have been a challenge this year. She shared that the school was scheduled to get replacement computers last summer, but that was cancelled due to budget limitations. AP Lardell also noted that the current computers are Gen 1 and Gen 2 and becoming obsolete. With respect to technical problems with the current student laptops, he shared that the DC Office of the Chief Technology Officer (OCTO) reimaged the computers this past summer but performed the update incorrectly, which has contributed to the troubles. Maury's assigned IT specialist has been onsite fixing that mistake.

AP Lardell also shared that the school would love for parents to advocate with DCPS to provide students with updated/working computers - especially for the students in testing grades (3-5). Melissa Taylor is the OCTO program manager. Jermaine Hinkson is Maury's IT Asset Administrative Specialist who has been providing the school with different resources such as keyboards and chargers.

Q: Could the PTA or parents help purchase computers for the school and student use?

A: Principal Hassler replied that computers for school/student use must be purchased and provided by DCPS. She also explained that computer purchases do not come out of the school's budget.

- Q: What about headphones for the student laptops? Might parents purchase and provide those for students if needed?
- A: Patrick Koontz noted that DCPS does not provide those, but that the school bought a large number out of the school supply budget and there are 200-300 in house. Principal Hassler noted that headphones are generally shared by students, but parents could provide headphones for their kids if they wish.
- Office of the Deputy Mayor for Education (DME) Boundary Study The DC Advisory Committee on Boundaries 2023 final recommendation with respect to Maury-Miner follows:

Final recommendation: Maury-Miner ES Rec 21.1 Only revision to the recommendation since Feb 6 is to clarify that the earliest the feasibility of exploring pairing the schools would be SY2026-27 (instead of 2027). This timeline takes into account two school years of consistent leadership at both schools.

Received feedback from some community members that boundary revisions are preferred to pairing the school and could be considered for future explorations, particularly Boundary Option 2 in the Maury and Miner community meeting materials. No revisions to Recommendation 21.2: Irrespective of the community working group being convened, DCPS shall implement the at risk set aside at Maury ES (as indicated in Recommendation 20) to help support socioeconomic integration at the school. DCPS should consider the impact of the at risk set aside at Maury ES as well as the enrollment, utilization, and at risk percentage at Miner ES before convening the Maury-Miner Community Working Group.
